2:45-3:45 PM [Session 3]	Microaggressions, the everyday offenses marginalized people experience, affect us all. Jews of Color, Jews of Multiracial background, and White Jews are not immune to the American experience, in which middle class white standards are presented as the norm. They may act on assumptions that hurt people who do not look, sound, dress, or speak the same way. We should address this problem and improve the way people engage with one another. In this workshop, you will learn one approach to teaching JOC and JMF about how to prevent microaggressions and how to respond when they do occur.	How do you engage white Jewish parents in exploring their white identities and creating strategies to examine and transform their practice? How do you nurture collaboration with other white Jewish parents so that they both support and hold each other accountable? Learn how challenge-by-choice can help you to examine your privilege and lean into vulnerable, yet empowering, space where you can develop culturally competency and gain skills and resources to support your own and your child(ren) positive racial identities.	Through presentation, individual reflection, group dialogue, and excerpts of music, this workshop explores race by analyzing spoken word poetry and Israeli, Hip-Hop, R&B, and Other Genre of Music and its impact on Jews of Color and Jews of Multiracial Background through an unbiased lens. This workshop seeks to help participants develop an understanding an appreciation of content based on music as part of a multicultural education. The emphasis on this workshop is to provide concrete, practical strategies, and practice to increase our toolbox as advocates. Participants will work to make connections between their experiences and those of the artists, gain a clear understanding of the concepts, identify commonalities with other participants, appreciate differences and work together. 	Got adversaries? Get allies!	The Art of Storytelling: Helping JOC and JMF Find and Share Their Voice

7:30-8:30 PM [Session 4]	The word "ally" is tossed around quite casually with the assumption that all who hear and employ it understand exactly what it means. We will use panelists to engage participants in a dialogue about how to identify, utilize, and build the ranks of allies within JOC, JMF, and the Jewish community as a whole. The purpose of this workshop is multifold. First, we will share how to deconstructed the word and concept of "ally" and by default, the word "adversary". Next, through a panel discussion, we will explore the characteristics and qualities that are used to identify community members as allies. Finally, we will present participants with a framework for engaging in dialogue about this topic and will offer practical strategies for people to implement as they build and support "allyship" within their own communities".	Giving voice to issues of equity and social justice is a crucial part of our diversity work. This work reminds us of the importance of providing JOC and JMF with windows to see and hear the experiences of others. It also reminds us of the importance of providing mirrors for our community, so they can see themselves reflected in many spaces. A powerful way to provide this is through the art of storytelling. Providing JOC and JMF with opportunities to find, strengthen, and share their voice can be a transformative experience for both the orator and the audience. TEDx events and TED-Ed clubs exemplify this, allowing individuals to discover, explore, and present their own ideas and many facets of their identity in the form of short, TED-style talks.
